

What is age-friendly?

WHO Age Friendly Values

“Age friendly” is more than *senior services*.

- Age- friendly cities and communities foster healthy and active ageing for residents of all ages.
- They enable older people to:
 - age safely in a place that is right for them;
 - be free from poverty;
 - continue to develop personally; and
 - to contribute to their communities while retaining autonomy and dignity.

Principles Central to WHO Age- Friendly Communities

- **Respect** for diversity: Older people are a heterogeneous group with diverse capacities, resources, life-styles and preferences that should be respected
- **Equity**: Inequities between groups (including but not limited to age, gender, disability, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, ethnicity, religion/ beliefs, rural/urban) should be identified and addressed.
- **Participation** of older people in all spheres of life and their contributions should be valued and fostered
- **Rights** of older people should be respected so that they may age and die with dignity

WHO Global Network Mission Statement


The mission is to stimulate and enable cities and communities around the world to become increasingly age-friendly.

Supports age-friendly leaders who are doing the work of strengthening collaborations for meaningful and sustainable community impact.




Key Lessons of Successful Collaboration

- Set during the expectation that all partners will work to breakdown silos, which includes agency boundaries, work may be done differently in the future
- The Coalition Leadership commits to partners to complete tests of change, identify barriers, challenges and best practice innovations
- Partners can operate at a meaningful level of authority but with a supportive and consistent oversight by the Coalition for back up problem solving.
- All partners commit to measuring cross system process and outcome metrics, data collection is streamlined, and unintended outcomes are anticipated

Coalition Policy Efforts to Support Innovations	Partner Strategies
Commitment to shared mission, vision, values and later, the goals	Participate in data collection and designing response to community assessment data
Cross System Communication: Who needs to know?	Access to Thought Leaders and Collaborative Members to gain internal support
Ongoing Cross Training and Staff Development for partners and employees	Development of Plans for Change and Implementation
Planning for Sustainability: Will the implemented plan need ongoing funding	Communication
Measurement and Monitoring Outcomes – what, how, analysis, segmentation, communication	Monitoring and Community Response

The outcome indicators will mainly be related to issues of accessibility and inclusiveness as key facets of urban life.


Physical accessibility of public facilities: health and social services, transportation, recreation facilities.

Measuring and Monitoring Outcomes

- Create a subset of the coalition to focus on metrics and evaluation of efficiency
- They can acknowledge data already known and have access to administrative data baselines and demographics
- Develop collaborative outcome measures that measure baseline outcomes and consensus on intended improvements
- Design and regularly review a data dashboard to monitor outcomes
